






ESHHAD. Jamp

Eshhad documented **24 incidents** in the second quarter of 2017. Of the **24 incidents** documented, **21 incidents** were against Christians, **one incident** targeted a Shi'a Muslim, and **two incidents** involved both Sunni Muslims and Christians.¹

This quarter, **81 people** were killed in sectarian violence compared to **15 deaths** the previous quarter. This is the highest recorded number of deaths during any quarter since Eshhad began documenting (Figure 1).




Figure 3: Provinces with the Most Sectarian Incidents (Total Since August 2013)

In the second quarter of 2017, **seven incidents** of the documented **24 incidents** occurred in Minya. Overall, Minya and Assiut rank as the two provinces to have witnessed the most sectarian incidents since Eshhad started documenting in August 2013 (Figures 2 and 3). Although Assiut remains the location with the second highest number of incidents overall, this quarter Eshhad documented **zero incidents** in the province. In the past two quarters, Cairo and Alexandria have both risen in ranking on the list of provinces with the most sectarian incidents, with Cairo likely to bypass Assiut in coming months if the trend continues.

Figure 2: Total Incidents Since August 2013

During the second quarter of 2017, there were no changes in the ranking of the districts with the most sectarian incidents, though each district did experience additional incidents (Figure 4). Cairo and Alexandria remain ranked on this list after having risen onto it in the first quarter of this year.

Three of this quarter's incidents were abductions or disappearances, bringing the total to 97 since August 2013—still the most prevalent incident type to be recorded overall. According to Figure 5, looting/destruction of property and arson/burning are the second and third most frequent incident types, a consistent trend overall.

Consistent with the spike in deaths in 2017, as first seen in the first quarter of this year, Eshhad documented three bombings, one beheading, three shootings, and two stabbings this quarter.

Non-state actors carry out a vast majority of sectarian incidents in Egypt: of the **534 total incidents** recorded since August 2013, state actors directly carried out **75 of the incidents (14 percent)** and non-state actors carried out **459 incidents (86 percent)**.

This quarter, of the **21 incidents** perpetrated by non-state actors, **seven incidents**, compared to **10** last quarter, were claimed by two different branches of Islamic State, the Islamic State in Egypt and Wilayat Sinai.

Note: The fact that victims of sectarianism in Egypt are predominantly Christian is a consistent and unsurprising trend. Christian denominations make up the majority of religious minorities in Egypt, and many smaller minority groups are not always vocal or public when incidents do occur, which leads to significant under-reporting and lack of data. Although it is known that Egypt's minorities are all discriminated against or persecuted in a variety of ways, incidents against Christians dominate the statistics: Between August 2013 and the second quarter of 2017, of the recorded incidents, **92 percent** of the victims targeted self-identify as Christians.
